

For 125 years, going to Cedar Point in Sandusky, Ohio has been the fun event of the summer for millions of people. Its sandy beaches, famous coasters and ride-packed midway have entertained countless visitors and made it among America's most acclaimed amusement parks. Your memories, photos or film could be part of WBGU-TV's historic documentary.
